Building a Firm Foundation

Yesterday afternoon, I had the opportunity to hop on a bus and volunteer with our New Student Programs team for a trip out to Independence, Texas, with Group 2 of Baylor Line Camp. Even after eight years here at Baylor, I am still blown away by how impactful that experience is for not only our students, but as a staff member.

After three days of combined Orientation and Line Camp, our new freshmen and transfer students are still operating on a magical mix of nerves and excitement that is never more evident than when riding a bus to Independence with them.

Once in Baylor's original hometown, our new students learn about the university's history. More importantly, the trip allows Baylor Line Campers a very tangible moment to visualize themselves no longer as outsiders, but as important members of the Baylor Line. This experience is the connecting point for them between our university's past and its future, shifting each present group of Bears into the family through a ceremony that is often emotional for both the incoming students and our NSP student leaders.

Having a couple-hour trip home on a bus also allows for time to reflect on both the impact of these programs and of our own work. It is a reminder that the work that we do in Student Life is quite literally changing the world by equipping the next generation.

But why are these programs and this work so important? Because they lay a foundation for our students' success during their academic years at Baylor.

Take a look at that dark green line. Students who attend Orientation and Baylor Line Camp retain at a rate of 93 percent from their first- to second-year at Baylor. If you aren't aware, that is a statistic that almost every university in the world would find enviable.

I am so appreciative of the opportunity to ride out to Independence with our students. It reminds me why we do what we do. Thank you to <u>NSP</u> for leading our entire division during these summer months, and for providing the foundation upon which our students will build four years of success.
